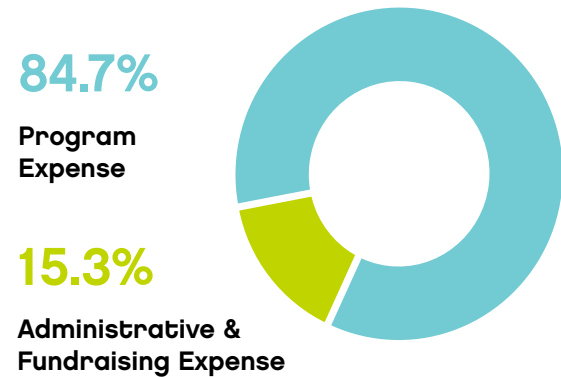

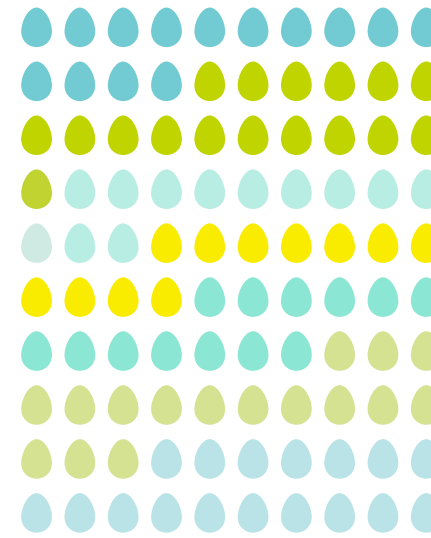

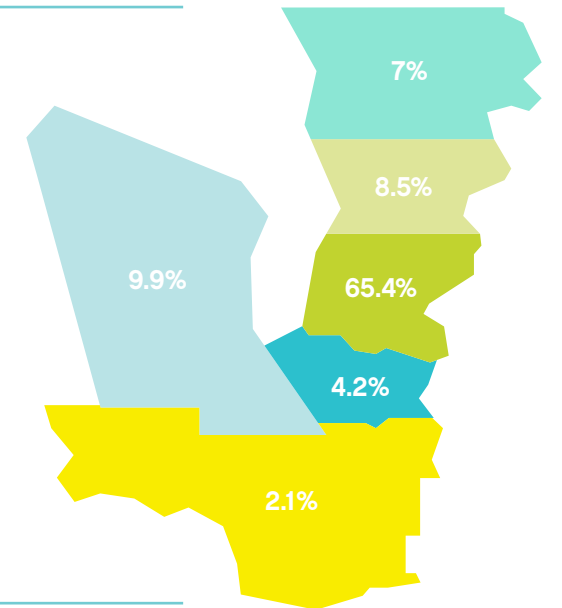
2020 Grant Distribution



- 14% fostering parent-child attachment & parenting skills
- 17% helping homeless youth to build resources & resilience
- 12% helping families escape & recover from violent homes
- 11% transitioning homeless families to stability & self-reliance
- 13% mentoring & tutoring to guide & support at-risk youth
- 16% building foster care & adoption to promote permanency
- 17% treatment to heal children who have experienced abuse

Abused Deaf Women's Advocacy Services: 30,000
Housing, counseling, parenting and children's programs for Deaf and DeafBlind victims of sexual/domestic violence. (S)

Anacortes Family Center: 12,000
Housing, intensive case management and support services for vulnerable children, women and families facing homelessness.

Center For Human Services: 13,700
Support services and parenting education to help related caregivers of at-risk children gain skills and resources.

ChildStrive: 12,000
Therapeutic in-home parenting support and education for families living with trauma or chronic hardship.

Denise Louie Education Center: 12,000
High-quality multicultural early learning and family support services.

Domestic Abuse Women's Network: 14,000
Comprehensive, empowerment-based programs and services to help survivors and their children attain and maintain violence-free lives.

Domestic Violence & Sexual Assault Services: 12,000
Services to increase child safety and prevent future violence for families who have experienced domestic violence.

Domestic Violence Services of Snohomish County: 100,000
Community education plus shelter, case management and integrated support for victims of domestic abuse and their children in Snohomish County. (E)

Family Education & Support Services: 12,000
Program to help related caregivers of abused children gain skills, support and resources to ensure the children in their care thrive.



Family Law CASA: 30,000
Advocates for at-risk children in high-risk custody cases. (S)

InterFaith Association of NW Washington: 30,000
Referral, support and advocacy services for families during and after their stay in emergency shelter. (S)

LiFeWire: 30,000
Support groups, advocacy assistance and one-on-one counseling for children and youth who have experienced violence or abuse in their homes. (S)

Lutheran Community Services Northwest: 30,000
Provides safe, secure and permanent homes for children who have experienced abuse and neglect. (S)

Lydia Place: 30,000
Parent educator home visits, group parenting education and therapeutic interventions for children in shelters and transitional housing. (S)

Mary's Place: 12,000
Emergency shelter and support services for homeless families to minimize trauma and assist them in moving quickly to safe, longer-term housing.

New Phoebe House Association: 10,000
Comprehensive recovery and reunification program for families who face multiple challenges and are involved with the child welfare system.

Parent Trust for Washington Children: 30,000
Support and education services for at-risk families through every stage of a child's life. (S)

Readiness To Learn: 10,000
Programs to stabilize the school experience for students during difficult periods and connect their families to basic needs resources.

Rochester Organization of Families: 30,000
Resources and services for children, youth and families to achieve a healthy, positive and drug-free community. (S)

SafePlace: 30,000
Basic needs and comprehensive, age-appropriate support services for children and teens in families who have experienced domestic violence. (S)

Solid Ground: 30,000
Programs and support for children who have experienced homelessness and domestic violence. (S)

Vashon Youth & Family Services: 30,000
Wraparound and trauma-informed programs that promote protective factors for children and families. (S)

Vine Maple Place: 15,000
Comprehensive housing and support services for single parents and their children to build stability and self-sufficiency.

Vision House: 30,000
Transitional housing and integrated support services for homeless mothers and their children. (S)

Youth Eastside Services: 11,000
Research-based mental health interventions for very young children with risk factors for poor brain development.

Empowering Youth

A Way Home Washington: 75,000
A statewide movement that builds awareness and increases community capacity to prevent and end youth and young adult homelessness. (V)

Big Brothers Big Sisters of Southwest Washington: 30,000
Mentoring for children who are at risk of dropping out, violence, substance abuse and other juvenile problem behaviors. (S)

Boys & Girls Clubs of King County: 10,000
Supportive and consistent services for youth experiencing foster care, kinship care and/or adopted from foster care.

Cocoon House: 30,000
Quality, safe and stable housing and wraparound support services for homeless youth and teen mothers for up to 18 months.

Communities In Schools of Lakewood: 30,000
Mentoring, tutoring and emergency services for underprivileged children provided through a network of community volunteers. (S)

Communities In Schools of Renton: 30,000
Mentoring, tutoring and wraparound support services for at-risk students. (S)

Friends of the Children: 100,000
Long-term professional mentoring to guide children facing tough challenges to reach their potential and achieve their goals. (E)

Friends of Youth: 30,000
Housing, support services and case management for homeless young parents and their children. (S)



FOCUS AREA: Strengthening Families

We provide grants that **prevent child abuse and neglect for families at the greatest risk**, and that support healing and stability for families impacted by domestic violence and homelessness. We prioritize programs that use integrated services to help build family protective factors.

Legal Counsel For Youth and Children: Multidisciplinary, holistic legal advocacy for children in child welfare, homeless youth and immigrant families.	13,300
Mockingbird Society: Foster care system development through youth leadership, legislative advocacy and extended family model for foster care. (S)	30,000
New Horizon Ministries: Comprehensive services for homeless youth and adults, such as overnight shelters, case management and a youth employment program.	11,000
Northwest Youth Services: Emergency housing and case management for homeless youth ages 13-17. (S)	30,000
Olive Crest: Serving youth ages 15-21 by providing safe and permanent housing, life-skills mentorship and wraparound services to heal from trauma. (S)	30,000



ROOTS: Emergency shelter, case management and access to a continuum of support services for homeless young adults in Seattle's University District. (S)	30,000
Ryan's House For Youth: Quality, safe and stable housing, including emergency shelter, transitional housing and drop-in center, with wraparound services for homeless youth 12-24.	16,300
SafeFutures Youth Center: Comprehensive services to help low-income and refugee/immigrant youth build healthy futures and break down barriers that hinder success. (S)	30,000
Seattle Education Access: Higher education advocacy and opportunities for young people struggling to overcome poverty and adversity. (S)	30,000
TeamChild: Advocacy and specialized legal services connecting high-needs youth in crisis with support programs and services.	13,300
Teen Feed: Low-barrier/trauma-focused crisis intervention, service referrals and life-skills mentorship for homeless, high-risk youth. (S)	30,000
Treehouse: Comprehensive support for the educational needs of youth in foster care. (E)	100,000
Youth Tutoring Program (CCS): Afterschool tutoring and enrichment program for kids living in Seattle low-income communities. (S)	30,000
YouthCare: Housing and support services for homeless minors ages 14-17. (E)	100,000
YWCA Clark County: Supports foster youth in their transition into adulthood and independence by connecting them with resources such as affordable housing, job training, financial education and healthcare.	13,300

FOCUS AREA: Empowering Youth



These grants help kids fulfill their potential, so they can make good life decisions and break the intergenerational cycle of abuse. We prioritize programs that focus on instilling youth with necessary assets to grow into strong, responsible adults, including positive role models and peer support.

Amara: Parenting and adoption services to create safety and permanence for at-risk and special-needs foster children.	11,000
Boyer Children's Clinic: In-home therapeutic intervention to support foster parents in building nurturing relationships with young children who have special healthcare needs.	13,000
Brigid Collins Family Support Center: Evidence-based services including therapy, case management and parenting education for at-risk families with children from birth to 12 years. (S)	30,000
Children's Therapy Center: Home visitation, counseling and referral services for foster caregivers to build secure caregiver/child attachments and parenting skills.	10,000
Encompass: Fully-equipped mobile lab to facilitate therapy programs for children and families in rural areas, homeless shelters, transitional housing and schools.	30,000
Holt International: Adoption and foster family services for Washington state families from recruitment/training to post-adoption support.	10,000
HopeSparks: Specialized counseling for children who have been abused or traumatized, with family support and parent education.	12,000
Housing Hope: Therapeutic programming to help homeless and at-risk families overcome barriers to age-appropriate development for their children.	11,000
Jumping Mouse Children's Center: Long-term expressive mental health therapy and social advocacy for abused and neglected children.	12,000
Kinderling Center: Home visitation, counseling and referral services for foster caregivers to build secure caregiver/child attachments and parenting skills.	11,000

King County Sexual Assault Resource Center: Array of therapeutic interventions to support healing in child and youth victims of sexual abuse and their families. (E)	100,000
Navos: Early intervention to help young children and their caregivers form secure attachments and break cycles of abuse and neglect. (S)	30,000
Northwest Immigrant Rights Project: Legal services and advocacy for abused, abandoned and undocumented immigrant children. (E)	100,000
Pediatric Interim Care Center: Immediate, short-term, medically supervised care for drug-exposed and fragile infants. (S)	30,000
Ryther: Residential and outpatient behavioral and mental health services for traumatized children and families struggling to succeed together.	15,200
Secret Harbor: Therapeutic foster care, in-home support and residential treatment services for young people who have experienced significant trauma due to abuse and neglect. (S)	30,000
Toddler Learning Center: Education services and therapy in the home for young children with intensive medical, mental or social risk factors. (S)	30,000
Wellspring Family Services: Trauma-informed early learning center and parenting support serving homeless families. (S)	30,000
Youth Advocacy Center of Lewis County: A multidisciplinary, child-focused approach to reducing the trauma of physical and sexual abuse on child victims.	6,000
YWCA Pierce County: Therapeutic and support services to mitigate the negative effects of domestic violence for children and teens.	6,000

FOCUS AREA: Healing Children



These grants help child victims of abuse and neglect heal from their traumatic experiences and find permanency and stability. We prioritize programs that target long-term benefits that build resiliency, and prevent survivors from growing up to become abusers themselves.
